

Summertime meant the beginning of school holiday adventures, family birthday's and Christmas.

I have many happy memories of growing up in a Duration Cottage in the late 1950s early 60s and one of those was the building of the summer cubby house.

I can recall the excitement of meeting up with my friends down at the creek. This creek usually had only a small stream of water until the heavy rains came and then the water would rise and sometimes flood. Our ages ranged from about 7 to 12 years, and even at that young age we were aware of possible dangers including snakes, spiders and swooping magpies.

The end of year school term lunch break would see us making plans for building the biggest and best cubbyhouse ever! The plan was to raid our backyards for any old crate boxes, rope, old fence palings anything really, the rest we would find in the paddock down near the creek.

I can hear mum saying "Be home before dark!" as I ran out to play. I would take a short cut through my neighbour's home that backed onto the paddock and would gingerly skirt a black cow called Pansy, and down to the small creek that divided the primary school from our homes. The sense of freedom came in the form of summer's heat and the smell of grass; long, green and dry and knowing no more school until next year.

Branches would be collected and stacked together sought of like a tepee, maybe not quite straight but it looked like it wouldn't fall down. Everyone would talk at once, but the plan was always clear to us. An old piece of tarp had been found and everyone agreed that it could be used as the roof or a wall or even the floor, the possibilities were endless. On and on the planning would go, there was no hurry as this cubby would take its shape over the summer months and would finally exhaust itself in the coolness of autumn.

When the sun would start to go down, our mum's warning of "Be home before dark! would see us race back to our homes yelling out to each other "See you later alligator! In a while crocodile!" until we were out of sight. Just one of many great memories.
