2018 ANZAC Day Commemorations:

St Marys ANZAC March – April 22nd

The students all enjoyed the tour. Another walk and talk up to St Mary Magdalene Anglican Church is to follow.



ARTICLE OF INTEREST

RAILWAY JOUNEYS 1886

After watching a number of the BBC's documentary 'Great British Railway Journeys' presented by Michael Portillo travelling around the railway networks of Great Britain and referring to an 1840s copy of *Bradshaw's Guide*. *This* encouraged the research for a similar guide for New South Wales Railways.



The National Library of Australia's internet site 'Trove' presented a copy. These guides were intended as convenient volumes of reference for excursionists and others travelling by railway in New South Wales. The guides contain information on various towns and stations and describe places of interest close to the railway line. In addition, tourist maps showing the railway line and roads and tracks are usually included.

Some volumes contain short histories of the railway system in New South Wales as well as sections on the geological formation, fauna and flora of the area. Volumes contained black and white illustrations and photographs of places of interest, advertisements and accommodation details.

'St. Marys (formerly South Creek Station), 29 miles; 113 feet above sea level. The country on either side of the Railroad, after it passes by the Rooty Hill Station to the westward is, for the most part, open, flat, and poor. Here and there the line passes through the bush, but there are not many trees near it. Before arriving at the South Creek Station (which is 18feet lower than Rooty Hill), the traveller may get another fine view of the Blue Mountain Range, which he is now approaching. St. Mary's Station is about 4 miles west of Rooty Hill, and about half a mile away to the north of St. Mary's – an old, pleasant, and prosperous village, on the Sydney and Penrith Road, chiefly dependent upon agricultural and grazing pursuits. Dairy farming, and wine making are also carried on. Large supplies of timber and firewood are likewise cut here, and forwarded by the line to Sydney, for use on the Railway and for sale. Tanning is largely carried on at this place, and a large number of bricks are also made. The principal hotels are the "Commercial" and "Volunteer" kept by Messrs. Byrnes and Cullen. Metropolitan sportsmen can often get a good day's shooting here, as hares, much to the annoyance of the farmers, are becoming fairly numerous in the district. South Creek takes its name from a considerable tributary to the river Hawkesbury, into which it eventually flows near Windsor.'
