

DESCENDENTS of the man who put the "Badgery" in Badgerys Creek have added their voices to the debate over



what to call Sydney's second airport — and they're keen to keep it in the family.

The Badgerys, on whose land the airport will be built, want the facility to keep the name of their ancestor, Andrew Delfosse Badgery, a pioneering aviator.

Badgery was the first man to fly an Australian-made plane, which he built himself on the family farm at Badgerys Creek a century before it was earmarked for an airport. Andrew Delfosse (Del) Badgery was the first to build a plane in Australia with his Caulder bi-plane.

He also chose the site for the Richmond RAAF base and was the first person to fly a plane from there. He was also the first person to fly a plane in Tasmania.

His granddaughter Janet Badgery, who is writing a book on his achievements, said naming Sydney's new airport after him was a no-brainer: "He was the first man to fly an Australian-built plane. He built it himself on his sister's veranda in Badgerys Creek and that's his grand accolade," she said.

Delfosse was an original aviator in Australia, similar to Charles Kingsford Smith, who Sydney Airport was named after."


Delfosse's great grandfather James Badgery settled the area as a successful farmer in 1799, just 11 years after Australia was colonised.

Del, as he was known, was born in an era when motor cars and planes were being invented. The sky was the limit.

Intrigued by planes, when he was 25 he gave up a career as a parliamentary clerk to move to England at his own expense and become a pilot and plane engineer. Three years later he returned to Australia as an aviator and built the Cauldron plane at Badgerys Creek.

"July 18, 1914, was one of the most significant days in Australian aviation. It was the first flight of the first Australian-built aircraft," Mrs Badgery said.

Ten days later World War I began and Badgerys flying skills were put to the ultimate test. "He enlisted as lieutenant and flew and dropped bombs over Egypt. When he came back to Australia he trained pilots. Because he had the mechanical knowledge of these early planes he also taught mechanics and oversaw the building of planes."
